Ohio Adolescent Health Centers (OAHC) provide programs to meet the requirements of the Parents Right to Know Act (HB 110).



Ohio Law	 Updates the Ohio law to provide sexual risk avoidance education for middle and high school students as incorporated in HB110. (State operating budget appropriations) Signed into law June 30, 2021 updating the venereal disease education law of 1999.
Parents Right to Know Act	• Requires Ohio public schools to provide sexual risk avoidance (SRA) education . Schools must teach the healthy standard of abstaining from sex until marriage and teach that abstinence from sexual activity is the only protection that is 100% effective against unwanted pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases.

OAHC programs provide facts and skills to avoid risk behaviors such as nonmarital sexual activity, alcohol, illicit drugs (including opioids), violence – including but not limited to bullying, dating violence, human trafficking, and suicide awareness and prevention – which meet the requirements of several laws.

The Ohio Law specifically includes instruction in the following:


- a) Stress that students should abstain from sexual activity until marriage;
- b) Teach the potential physical, psychological, and emotional, and social side effects of participating in sexual activity outside of marriage;
- c) Teach that conceiving children out of wedlock is likely to have harmful consequences for the child, the child's parents, and society;
- d) Stress that sexually transmitted diseases are serious possible hazards of sexual activity;
- e) Advise students of the laws pertaining to financial responsibility of parents to children born in and out of wedlock;
- f) Advise students of the circumstances under which it is criminal to have sexual conduct with a person under the age of sixteen pursuant to ORC 2907.04; and
- g) Emphasize adoption as an option for unintended pregnancies.
